70 YEARS OF

2021—No event held (COVID-19 pandemic)

2020—Oak Bay sets a record with its sixth straight Island Championship and twenty-fifth overall. The Bays upset tournament favourite Claremont, who was the no. 1 ranked AAAA team on the Island since the start of the season, 73–69. Lucas Maffia follows up his brother's back-to-back Island MVPs with one of his own. The Maffia brothers are only the second set of brothers to win back-to-back MVPs behind Steve ('92) and Martin ('93) Nash. Oak Bay's Ethan Moore earns the Best Defensive Player award. Nanaimo upsets Belmont, 83–75, for third but fails, 90–57, in the BC Challenge game against Claremont.

2019—Oak Bay adds another Island title, making it five in a row and its 24th overall with a 91–72 win over Belmont. Diego Maffia drops 53 in the final, enroute to back-to-back MVP awards. Belmont's Danny Song earns the honour of the Best Defensive Award. Claremont finishes third over Dover Bay but then falls short by one point, 62–61, to Belmont in the BC Challenge game for the second BC berth.

2018—Oak Bay extends its record to 23 Island titles and current streak of four in a row, with a comfortable 105–56 win over Belmont. Oak Bay is led by junior guard and Island MVP Diego Maffia. Oak Bay's Luis Guerra earns the honour of Best Defensive Player. Cowichan finishes third over Dover Bay and then challenges Belmont for the second Island berth but falls short with an 86–54 Belmont victory. Belmont gets a favourable BC draw and goes on a great run and finishes fourth in BC.

2017—Oak Bay star guard Jaden Touchie earns both the MVP and Best Defensive Player awards as the Bays dominate yet another Island title, extending its own record to 22 Island Championships and current streak of three in a row. Belmont is down big early in the first but is able to battle back in the second to make it close but Oak Bay



keeps rolling and cruises to an 83–64 victory. Belmont survives the challenge game, 81–66, over third-place Cowichan to book its ticket to the provincials.

2016—Oak Bay makes 21 Island titles as it dismantles Cowichan 89–57. Oak Bay's Madhu McConnell is named MVP while teammate Jaden Touchie is the Best Defensive Player. Belmont survives, 68–66, host Dover Bay's efforts in the third place game.

2015—Oak Bay wins its record twentieth Island title, led by Island MVP Atlas St. Paul-Butler, with the largest known margin of victory in Island final history with a 98–68 win over Dover Bay. Cowichan beats G.P. Vanier, 57–49, for third and then beats Dover Bay in the challenge game for the second BC berth. Oak Bay finishes sixth in BC.

2014—Claremont, led by MVP Mason Loewen, beats Oak Bay 61–52 in the final, after building a 35–21 half-time lead and riding it to its second Island title. Belmont defeats Cowichan for third place and subsequently beats Oak Bay 71–54 in the challenge game for the second berth to the BCs.

2013—Claremont, led by MVP and Best Defensive Player Alex Jordache, builds a fifteen-point lead in the second quarter and is up twelve at the break. Cowichan has a strong start to the second half and narrows it to a two-point game but runs out of gas with five minutes to go and falls 66–57.

2012—Oak Bay wins its record nineteenth Island title as it defeats Belmont 68–60. Mt. Douglas captures third with a 54–51 win over Cowichan. Mt. Douglas goes on to finish eighth in BC, best of the Island teams. Belmont's Jordan Fenn becomes only the fifth player in Island history to be selected MVP from a non-winning team.

2011—Dover Bay wins its third title in five years. It beats Claremont in the final 63–61 in a North 1 versus South 1 match-up. Oak Bay finishes third and wins a challenge game 81–75 versus Claremont for the second berth to the BCs.

2010—Oak Bay defeats Dover Bay 70–62. With the return of three provincial berths, Cowichan, who places third, joins Oak Bay and Dover Bay at the BCs.

2009—Dover Bay squeaks by Cowichan 45–40 in overtime. However, with only two berths to the BCs, third-place Oak Bay has the right to challenge Cowichan for the final berth. Oak Bay prevails in a challenge game and secures the second berth to the Provincial Championship.

HISTORY (1951-2021)

2008—Belmont beats Mt. Douglas 68–61 in a surprising finals match-up. In his last year as head coach, Muzz Bryant takes his Bulldogs back to the BCs.

2007—Dover Bay makes it five straight years of great finishes, as Island MVP Pat McCarthy wins it with a putback with three seconds on the clock for a 49–47 win over Vanier. Oak Bay finishes third over Highland. Dover goes on to win the BC title with a 58–57 victory over Kits and Oak Bay gets fifth in BC with a 109–83 win over Yale.

2006—Oak Bay beats Vanier 81–80 in the fourth straight Island final that goes down to the wire. Cowichan finishes third and then finishes sixth in BC.

2005—Oak Bay beats Claremont 60–58 in the first-ever final to go into overtime. Wellington finishes third and goes on a run to finish second in BC.

2004—Mt. Douglas beats host Wellington 59–57 on a very deep trey at the buzzer by tournament MVP Jordan Brown.

2003—Ballenas, in its first-ever AAA Islands, beats host SMUS in front of a packed pro-Blue Jag crowd. Tournament MVP Evan Trickey hits a 15-footer at the buzzer to win it for the Whalers.

2002—Claremont wins its first-ever Islands beating out crosstown rival SMUS and then goes on a magical run and finishes second in the BCs.

2001—Stelly's wins its first Islands, knocking off Oak Bay in another crosstown final.

2000—Oak Bay wins its fifteenth Island Championship and is led by the son of former Bay, Island, and BC MVP Chris Trumpy Sr. In the final, Chris Trumpy Jr. wins his own MVP as Oak Bay downs Wellington.

1999—SMUS, led once again by Danny Boticki, easily defeats Ladysmith 91–63 to win back-to-back Island titles.

1998—SMUS, led by MVP Danny Boticki, defeats crosstown rival Oak Bay 64–58. Dover Bay beats Esquimalt 75–57 to get the third berth to the BCs.

1997—**Alberni**, led by MVP Nick Seredick, wins its fifth Island title, defeating Cowichan 84–74 for a return trip to the BCs. Mt. Douglas beats Dover Bay 79–69 to capture the third and final BC berth.

1996—Wellington wins its first-ever Island Championship. MVP Steve MacDonald's 26 points helps defeat Stelly's 74–73 at the buzzer despite Aaron Olsen's 32-point performance. Vic High knocks off Alberni 93–75 for third place. All four teams advance to the BC Championship at GM Place.

1995—SMUS, led by Allister Wilmott, defeats crosstown rival Mt. Douglas at the buzzer in what is arguably the tournament's most dramatic final (80–79). Ladysmith finishes third and goes on to win the BC Championship.

1994—Carihi, led by MVP Eric Hinrichsen, wins its first Island Championship, beating Ladysmith 90–76. SMUS knocks off Vanier for the third and final berth to the BCs.

1993—SMUS, led by MVP Martin Nash, beats Vanier 80–63. Esquimalt takes the third BC berth with a win over Cowichan. Martin Nash sets a new benchmark for one game with 55 points against Esquimalt in the semi-finals.

1992—SMUS, led by MVP (and future NBAer) Steve Nash, defeats Alberni 80–71. SMUS goes on to win the BCs with one of the most dominating performances ever seen in BC high school tournament history. Belmont Braves take the final BC berth by stopping the Nanaimo Islanders 82–72.

1991—SMUS, led by MVP Jason Reynolds, wins its first Island title by defeating Belmont 56–47. Belmont then finishes third in the BCs. Esquimalt beats Alberni 66–58 for the third BC berth.

1990—Spectrum, led by MVP Wayne Moore, captures its second Island Crown with a 79–75 win over Oak Bay. Barsby of Nanaimo finishes third with a 63–58 win over Parkland to capture the final BC berth.

1989—Nanaimo wins its fourth Island Championship.



70 YEARS OF

1988—Oak Bay wins its fourteenth Island Championship with a 95–68 victory over Alberni in Port Alberni. Alberni qualifies for its first trip to the BCs in 24 years and goes on to finish fourth. Nanaimo finishes third with a 79–78 victory over Spectrum. Brett Nohr of Nanaimo is named the tournament's MVP.

1987—**Mt. Douglas** defeats Parkland 63–55 and is led by tournament MVP Tony Nelson.

1986—Spectrum wins its first-ever Island title. After defeating Cowichan 65–58, Spectrum wins the final over crosstown rival Mt. Douglas. Travis Annis of Cowichan breaks two tournament records: most points in a game (39) and most points in a tournament (133). Oak Bay's Dimitri Gilbert ties Greg Walters of Cowichan for the most-times-selected tournament MVP (two).

1985—Oak Bay, led by MVP Dimitri Gilbert, wins its thirteenth Island title by defeating Belmont 65–50. Vanier beats Mt. Douglas 86–75 for third place.

1984—Parkland, led by MVP Kevin Ottewell and Tom Johnson, wins the school's second Island title with a 53–46 win over Nanaimo. Cowichan clinches third with a 78–69 victory over the Alberni Chieftains.

1983—Nanaimo wins its third Island Championship with a 61–54 victory over Mt. Douglas.

1982—Mt. Douglas: The tournament moves to Port Alberni for an all-South Island final between Mt. Douglas and Oak Bay with the Rams winning 69–46. Hometown Chieftains take third with a 56–52 win over Carihi. Alberni's Dave Bakken is tournament MVP.

1981—Cowichan: For the second year in a row, two North Island teams battle for the title. Cowichan, led by Greg Walters, beats Nanaimo 74–68. Walters becomes the first player to win the MVP twice. Vic High Totems get third with a 68–57 win over the Belmont Braves.

1980—Nanaimo wins. And for the first time in the 30-year history of the Islands, the South is shut out of the BCs. NDSS beats Vanier in the final while Cowichan, led by MVP Greg Walters, takes the third BC berth.

1979—Parkland makes the trip north and beats Nanaimo.

1978—Nanaimo: With the tournament at Malaspina College, the hometown Islanders defeat Oak Bay in the Island final to spoil Don Horwood's quest for six in a row. Then, just for good measure, Nanaimo beats Oak Bay in the

BC final 71–62. Greg Kazanowski is the Island MVP and his brother, future National team member Gerald Kazanowski, is named BC MVP.

1977—Oak Bay, under Don Horwood, makes five Island titles in a row. Second goes to Spectrum who upsets a strong Nanaimo squad.

1976—Oak Bay, led by MVP Mike Miller, defeats Courtenay in the final while the Belmont Braves capture the third and final BC berth.

1975—Oak Bay: Silver Anniversary! Bill Lawrie makes presentations to Mrs. Bill Reid & Lawrie Wallace for their outstanding contributions to Island basketball.

1974—Oak Bay: Ten-minute quarters, no three-point play, and other new rules—same winner. Bays over Mt. Douglas 57–48.

1973—Oak Bay is the Island and BC Champs. Chris Trumpy Sr. is named Island MVP.

1972—Belmont is coached by Wally Russell and led by MVP Lee Edmonson. It places third in the BCs.

1971—Oak Bay wins its seventh Island Championship, this time coached by Don Horwood.

1970—Mt. Douglas, coached by Don Puddy and led by Jim Hunter and Jim McKay, wins its first Island title.

1969—Oak Bay wins its fifth straight Island Championship but loses in the BC final to Vic High 38–37.

1968—Oak Bay, led by Dave Morgan, wins the Islands and then the BCs.

1967—Oak Bay wins its third in a row defeating Chemainus and MVP Bill Robinson 34–29.

1966—Oak Bay wins, this time led by Brian McKenzie, but loses to Vic High in the BC finals.

1965—Oak Bay, led by Bob Burrows, wins the Islands and BCs, both at the expense of the Alberni Chieftains.

1964—Vic High beats Courtenay.

1963—Alberni, Jack Gilbert's Chieftains, led by Alec Brayden, John Drew and Marvin Johnson, beats Nanaimo 66–52.

1962—Tsolum, led by MVP Larry Lehtonen, defeats Alberni.

1961—Oak Bay: Gary Taylor's Bays beats Vic High 54-53.

HISTORY (1951-2021) continued...

1960—Courtenay is sparked by Gordon Bechter for its first Island title. It defeats defending BC Champ Vic High in the final.

1959—Vic High shows it is the dominant team of the 50s. It goes on to become the first Island team to win the BCs.

1958—Vic High wins its fourth Island title and finishes fourth in BC.

1957—Cumberland breaks Vic High's streak and goes on to get second in BC.

1956—Vic High wins the Islands and Alberni finishes second in the BCs.

1955—Vic High wins again but Alberni places second in the BCs.

1954—Vic High wins its first Islands and finishes fourth in the BCs.

1953—Alberni, led by MVP Claude Schick who was an All-Star for three straight years, makes it three in a row for the Chieftains.

1952—Alberni wins again but Buzz Jacklin of Nanaimo is awarded the tournament MVP.

1951—Alberni wins the first Vancouver Island Tournament. Twitter Hill is the first MVP.
