Ted Meldrum - Challenge Coordinator - Mount Douglas



Mr. Meldrum attained his Bachelor of Arts in Geography and History in 1994, finishing his degree during the evenings while working full time as a land surveyor assistant. Five years after graduating from the University of Victoria, Mr. Meldrum returned to the University of Victoria and completed his post degree program, earning his teacher certification while starting his family, and finishing in the top 5% of his classes. Mr. Meldrum began teaching gifted students in the Esquimalt High School Challenge program before moving on to the Alternative Education and the Adult Education Programs. Arriving at Mt. Douglas in 2009, Mr. Meldrum once again started teaching gifted students in 2010, starting with Social Studies 10 and moving on to all Social Studies from grade 9 - 11. In 2015, he took over the position of

Challenge Coordinator with a focus in improving the relationships and connections for students in the Program. Wherever Mr. Meldrum has taught, he has created innovative programs and revitalized existing programs. Mr. Meldrum has continued to hone all aspects of his teaching practices, focusing on working with gifted students, connecting with youth at risk, improving student connections to learning, and enhancing interactions of gifted students. He is a co-winner of the Government of Canada History Award for 2016.

Neal Johnson - Science & Math - Mount Douglas



Neal Johnson has focused on Gifted Education his entire teaching career. His unusual degree is a Bachelor of Education in General Sciences Expanded (With Distinction) granted by the University of Victoria in 1996. This specialized degree allowed him to integrate Physics with other sciences such as Chemistry, Biology, Astronomy, and Geophysics. By 1998, Mr. Johnson had been recruited to teach fulltime within the Cedar Hill Junior Secondary Challenge Program, and a year later was asked to serve as Challenge Coordinator for this district program. He accepted and guided the program until 2009, including transitioning the program into its present setting at Mount Douglas Secondary. Many people may be familiar with Mr. Johnson based on his work supporting students in competitions at Mount Douglas as well as at various Middle Schools. As a teacher sponsor for the Provincial Math Challengers, National University of Waterloo Math competitions, Canadian Open Mathematics Challenge, and the provincial Kwantlen STEM competition, Mr. Johnson has been very fortunate to help students win many championships. Since 2005, Mount Douglas Secondary has been recognized as the top performing school on Vancouver Island for these Mathematics and STEM competitions, and even won Top STEM School in British Columbia at the 2019 Kwantlen Provincial STEM

Competition. In recognition of all of the work and successes Mr. Johnson has experienced with his students over his career, he was nominated for and subsequently honored to receive the **Outstanding Teacher Award** from the University of Chicago. Given that Mr. Johnson himself was designated as "Gifted" and one of his children also received this designation, it is not surprising that he has such a passion for Gifted Education. He has experienced the substantial benefits from the perspective of student, parent, and teacher.

Jordan Bell – English – Mount Douglas



As a Mt. Doug alumnus and former Challenge student, Jordan Bell is thrilled to pass on his positive experience to a new generation. Mr. Bell was raised by a professorial patriarch possessing a pronounced proclivity for poetry; this upbringing, along with his student years in the classroom of Mt. Douglas legend Mr. Greene, likely sealed Mr. Bell's fate of becoming an English teacher himself. After completing his BA English Honours with Distinction and Post-Degree Professional Program at the University of Victoria, Mr. Bell spent time teaching on the British Columbia mainland and in Japan before returning to Victoria and joining School District 61 in 2016. He also enjoys theatre, and has discreetly performed in productions at Langham Court and St. Luke's. Mr. Bell is sincerely grateful to work here at Mt. Douglas, where he is inspired each day by the excellence of his colleagues and students.

Amelita Kucher - Science - Mount Douglas



After a decade spent exploring the world and its cultures, Amelita Kucher immersed herself at the University of Victoria earning a Co-op degree in Biology with a minor in Environmental Studies. Her work as a university TA and as a Parks naturalist and interpreter led her into a teaching career. Now head of the Science Department, Ms. Kucher brings experiential learning into her Science, Biology and Earth Science classes with explorations, yoga stretches and hands-on laboratory work. Fluent in French, she takes Mount Doug students to France every two years as the coordinator of our France Exchange. Ms. Kucher documents many of the school's activities as an experienced photographer. She spends her leisure hours hiking, biking and enjoying Victoria's culture.

Allan Williams – English – Mount Douglas



A graduate of the University of British Columbia and Simon Fraser University, Alan Williams moved to Victoria for love, and began teaching at Mount Douglas in 2003. His first experience working with gifted students was when he helped create the Mini School at Killarney Secondary in Vancouver. He has taught French, ESL, PE and Social Studies, but for the last five years has focused on teaching English in the Challenge Program, as well as Drama. An accomplished field hockey player, he played on the Canadian Men's National Squad for three years, and coached the UVic Vikes for six years. Denying a mid-life crisis, Alan has morphed into the loud singer of a teacher rock band, hoping to tour portables everywhere.

Sean Lansdell – English – Mount Douglas



Sean Lansdell graduated from the University of Victoria with a Bachelor of Arts in English Literature. During his undergraduate studies, he spent many of his nights working as a cook in various restaurants throughout Victoria. Despite a passion for cooking that led him to consider a culinary career; he ultimately began a post-teaching degree teacher internship and earned his certification in 2007. Mr. Lansdell has been at Mount Douglas since 2012. He became a teacher because of his love of storytelling and his appreciation of the constructs of language; he aims to pass on his enthusiasm to his students. THE GIFTED LEARNER

A talented and gifted learner possesses a variety of characteristics that may include high task commitment, social and emotional intensity, creative and/or productive thinking and above average intelligence. This individual has a thirst for knowledge, has a passion for learning and requires differentiated educational opportunities and services.

In keeping with the Ministry's definition of giftedness, the selection process used to identify such students gives heavy weighting to high intellectual ability as reflected in test scores and academic performance; and high task commitment, as indicated in written presentations, documentation and interviews, and highly creative assignments and hobbies.

DISTRICT CHALLENGE TESTING PROGRAM

In order for students to be considered for the Challenge Program they must be tested. The testing is used in conjunction with the student's application to create a student profile. The information below is intended to help you understand District Program's testing process.

A test schedule will be sent to each applicant (via e-mail or phone) and the information will be sent to their current school during the latter part of January. This notice will specify the scheduled testing date and time. The student is to come to the designated spot for testing on the day and time specified. If your child cannot attend on the date scheduled, please call or e-mail the school to re-schedule your child's testing session. If your child is ill on the day of his/her test, please call the school in the morning to arrange for an alternative date.

ADMISSION PROCEDURE

- 1. The School Based Teacher or Principal may select students who they consider eligible for consideration. Selections may be based upon identification materials contained in the District #61 Resource Book for teachers of Challenge students. Parents may also refer their children for consideration by applying through Mount Douglas Secondary School.
- Part 1 of the application form can be filled in the night of the information meeting January 10th, 2023 at 7:00 p.m. or returned to Mount Douglas Secondary School at 3970 Gordon Head Road in person to the main office or by mail, fax or email (FAX: 250-477-0277 Email mtdouginfo@sd61.bc.ca) by Tuesday, January 24, 2023.
- 3. <u>Part 2</u> of the application package should be delivered to Mt. Douglas at your assigned testing session time on <u>Friday</u>, January 27, 2023.

- 4. Upon receipt of the Challenge Application, an evaluation form will be sent to the student's current teacher(s).
- 5. <u>**Testing:**</u> Parents and students will be provided with more information about the testing session via e-mail.

S C R E E N I N G

- 1. Once all information is received and collated, the Screening Committee will meet and decisions will be made to
 - i) accept the applicant into the District Program; or
 - ii) place the applicant on a wait list pending available seats in the District Program; or
 - iii) notify the applicant that he/she has not been accepted into the District Program.

2. Mount Douglas will

- i) establish and maintain a roster of recommended students;
- ii) communicate in writing the status of the student to the recommending school and parents; and

iii) hold all student work and materials for pick up at Mount Douglas Secondary after the selection process is complete.

3. Appeal Procedure

- a. The Committee will discuss the decision with the parents and with the student, if appropriate.
- b. Upon request of the parents and student, the District Committee will reconsider previously and newly submitted information on a student who has not been placed in a gifted program.
- c. The appeal must be received in writing within two weeks of placement notification.

The information on the attached forms is collected under the authority of the School Act and will be used solely for the purpose of establishing eligibility for the District Challenge Program. It will be kept secure and confidential in accordance with the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act.

MOUNT DOUGLAS SECONDARY CHALLENGE PROGRAM

VISION STATEMENT

The Mount Douglas Secondary Challenge Program serves the unique needs of gifted, creative, and talented learners by creating a community which seeks to maximize student opportunities for enrichment, self-direction, independence, synergetic interaction and emotional well-being in a secure, mentoring atmosphere. The program will foster the development of individual excellence through differentiated educational experiences.

The Mount Douglas Secondary Challenge Program offers gifted, creative, and talented students an educational program consistent with their abilities which aims to prepare them for post-secondary education and the world at large. The program makes every attempt to ensure that students become knowledgeable and skilled in "core areas" of instruction. Acquisition of knowledge is seen as a cornerstone of the program; however, students do not learn in a rote manner but are expected, instead, to develop an understanding of relationships within knowledge, one of the hallmarks of an educated individual. Methods of instruction are also aimed at the development of higher order thinking skills. Activities and assignments routinely require students to analyze, synthesize or evaluate material covered. Similarly, students are asked to make logical extensions or to establish and justify conclusions.

Skill development is seen as a second cornerstone of the Challenge Program at Mount Douglas Secondary. A concerted attempt is made to ensure that students develop necessary research, organization and presentation skills. These skills flow naturally into independent study projects, which further hone individual skills while offering opportunities to develop creativity and skills in long term planning, time management and group dynamics.

Within the program, Grade 9 and 10 Challenge students stay together for the core subjects of Social Studies, English, Science and Mathematics. In Grade 11 and 12, Challenge students maintain the grouping in Social Studies, English and Mathematics and choose the appropriate Science courses. At the end of Grade 12, students will, upon completion of Social Studies 9-11, while have the option of writing the AP Human Geography 12 exam. The core subject grouping offers an environment and a peer group where interest in learning and facing intellectual challenges is seen as the norm and not as something unusual or undesirable. This constructive peer atmosphere is a tremendous advantage to the academically gifted student. On the other hand, the elective program provides the advantages of mixing challenge students with the rest of the student body and ensuring that they are well integrated into the school's broader culture.

The Mount Douglas Secondary Challenge Program offers students opportunities for enrichment in education, skill development, performance and accomplishment. It asks for keen intellectual interest and a commitment to shared goals.

We, in the program, look forward to working with new students towards these shared goals.
