Established in 1979 as a special education program for gifted and talented students.

About the Mt. Doug Program



Established in 2000, the Mount Douglas Gifted Program to date has consisted of implementation of an educational philosophy based on Gifted education research; refinement of the entrance procedure and designation process; and response of the program to suit the specific needs of individual students.

The Program offers gifted, creative, and talented students an educational program consistent with their abilities which aims to prepare them for post secondary education and the world at large. Acquisition of knowledge is seen as a cornerstone of the program; however, students do not learn in a rote manner but are expected, instead, to develop an understanding of relationships within knowledge.


"If anything, these findings affirm that gifted students need to be appropriately challenged so that they experience productive struggle in the learning process. Gifted programming can actually provide the challenging work as an opportunity to develop growth mindset beliefs- positive attitudes toward effort and making mistakes. In fact, when their needs are not being met and they are not challenged, this could set the stage for fixed mindset beliefs to develop; students are not used to hard work, and they may avoid persevering through difficult tasks and intellectual risk-taking when they are finally faced with such challenges."

Application Process

Steps:

- Application form
 - Complete online or print a hard copy and submit to Esquimalt High or Mt. Douglas by January 24
- Portfolio including letters of support, best work samples, items showing students' passions, student letter of intent, items that show students' personality, items students' are proud of, recent report card
- Teacher Evaluation Forms from a current teacher
- Testing
 - Writing sample
 - Aptitude tests
 - Otis-Lennon School Ability Test (OLSAT)
 - Criteria Cognitive Aptitude Test (CCAT)
- For Esquimalt High: Interview process in person or by Zoom
 - Candidates will be notified of date and time
